This summer nearly 25 Hmong families grew vegetable gardens on Ko and Terri Saelee's property in Rio, Wisconsin. Four years ago, knowing how important gardening is in the Hmong culture, the Saelee's decided to offer the use of their property for gardening, free of charge, to several families. Word spread, and each year it has grown. "Most of the people travel 25 or more miles from the city of Madison to garden here," said Terri. "Many of those who garden with us are not Christian, and it is exciting to see how God is using our feeble efforts. It doesn't take a lot of time for us to let them use our property, but it certainly opens up opportunities for us to witness."

Once, the Saelees invited two families over for dinner. One family was Adventist and the other was not. During the meal the two families found out they were related and struck up a friendship. The non-Christian family was very open to hearing about the beliefs of Seventh-day Adventists, and lingered to visit long after the meal was over.

Another woman came one day and found she was all alone in the garden. She was very frightened to be alone, having grown up believing in spirits. She told Terri, "I had to choose whether to go home or stay and have faith in God. Then I said to myself, 'You believe in God, what are you afraid of?'" That was a turning point in her faith experience with God.

In September, Saelee's held a free vegetarian barbecue picnic for all their gardening friends. "Over 50 people came," said Terri. "It was a wonderful opportunity to get acquainted with the families. Some of these people are going through really stressful family situations, and find the gardening therapeutic. It's fun being able to provide it. It's a seed sowing sort of thing."

## On the Move

One hundred and fifty years ago, several farmers in Oakland, Wisconsin began studying the Bible. They built a church, and shared the good news they found with their community. There was no organized Seventh-day Adventist church at that time. That would come two years later in 1863. But there was an Advent awakening, a focus on Scripture and a preparation for the soon coming of Jesus Christ.

At its core, the Seventh-day Adventist Church has always been a movement. It's always been more than an organization and buildings. It is people who have committed themselves to Christ and are dedicated to moving forward in sharing the good news of Jesus.

In Wisconsin, we are on the move. Evidence shows that many members are not satisfied with just doing what has always been done. Through health programs, community gardens, door-to-door literature work, small group Bible studies and evangelistic meetings members are seeking to reach out and share the love of Jesus in their communities.

As I look toward 2012, I am excited about two special emphases coming up.

1. The Great Controversy Project: This world-wide project seeks to get *The Great Controversy* into every home during the next two years. Information will be provided to pastors for bulk pricing on the full book or an abbreviated version.
2. Milwaukee Miracles: This five-year emphasis on Milwaukee offers a wonderful opportunity to make a major impact on the 2 million people who live in our largest metro area. A great work needs to be done in our cities. This five-year emphasis will depend upon church members and pastors teaming up together in this coordinated outreach.

Time is short. Opportunities to share the gospel may soon close. Let's move forward, sharing God's love like we never have before.

As we begin the coming year, I challenge you to lead one or more people to Jesus. God has called us to be His witnesses. May we be faithful to His calling and move forward in His strength.

## Milwaukee Picnic for Blind Community



It all started in 2004 when Melvin & Mary Sheire organized a picnic in the Milwaukee area for the blind community. Sheire, himself blind, wanted to provide an opportunity for blind people to enjoy socialization, friendship building, and interaction with local Christians.

August 7, 2011 was a perfect sunny day for the 8<sup>th</sup> annual blind picnic. Festivities were held at Frame Park in Waukesha. Forty guests, from as far away as Green Bay, Kenosha, and Sheboygan, paired up with sighted volunteer guides for the day.

The day's activities included paddleboat rides on the Rock River, surrey bicycle rides in the park, and speedboat rides at Pewaukee Lake. Activities were available to all guests and their guides. Buses provided transportation. Before everyone headed home, Sheire closed with prayer, expressing thanks for a safe and fun-filled afternoon.

Sheire partnered with the Milwaukee Central SDA church to organize the picnic and afternoon activities. A private donor sponsored the luncheon. Church members from the surrounding cities and some pathfinders provided volunteer support.

The primary form of advertisement was word-of-mouth. Sheire also utilized local organizations such as the Badger Association and BOLD (Blind Outdoor Leisure Development), sponsored by the Lion's Club, to spread the word about the event.

As a result of the interaction and friendships fostered by this activity, there have been three baptisms into the Seventh-day Adventist church. Currently several individuals are interested in learning more about Jesus and studying the Bible.

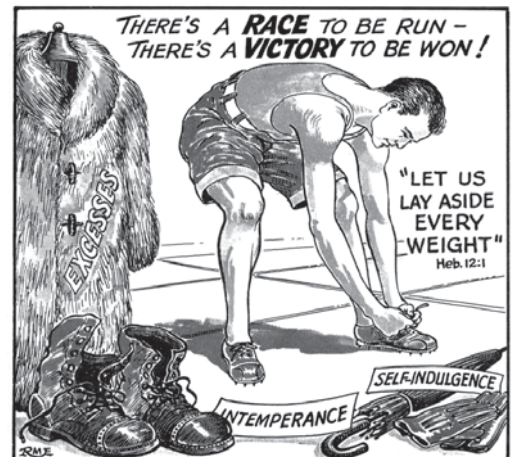

## Moments From the Past Prayer & Sacrifice

Andrew Olsen was preparing land for cultivation in the heart of an old Wisconsin oak forest in the 1860's. It meant long hours of back-aching labor. Small stumps were dug out with axe and grub hoe; large deep-rooted ones were left for the ox team to pull. One spring afternoon, Andrew returned from town with a letter from the newly organized Wisconsin conference telling of the progress and giving an urgent appeal for funds. Could the Olsen's possibly send \$100, it asked?

Olsen's ate their evening meal in silence. At worship, with an open Bible, each member of the family took turns praying for wisdom and the ability to meet this request. The parents slept little that night. In the morning they reached a decision; if the Lord would send a buyer willing to pay \$100 for their team of oxen, they would give this to the cause.

The men of the family went to their stump pulling. Using a center drum and 16 foot beam to which the oxen were hitched, they would wrap a cable around the stump and draw it out. The steady pull of the animals made land clearing a pleasure. Soon a neighbor appeared and watched from the edge of the field.

"Andrew," he shouted! "Would you be willing to sell me that yoke of oxen?"

"If I were to sell them, what would you care to pay for them?" Andrew asked.

The neighbor examined them thoughtfully then replied, "I'll give you \$100." Both knew this was a zenith price.

"Lars, the answer is yes," replied Andrew.

With mixed feelings, the family watched their faithful ox team being lead away. There was sorrow to see them go, and yet joy to be able to send the \$100 on its blessed mission. With axes and grub hoes, the father and sons returned to clearing stumps from their land.

*Andrew Olsen's farm was in Oakland, Wisconsin. Olsen donated part of his property for building a Seventh-day Adventist church, which is still in use today. Oakland SDA Church celebrated their 150th anniversary this year on September 3, 2011.*
